Condolences to Everett and the rest of Elva Anson's family

If anyone has further info on where the memorial will be, please let me know so I can share.

BTW. Everett was moving to a nursing home the week following our discussion.

President's Message

The Authors Booth at the California State Fair began in 1999, the sesquicentennial of the 1849 Gold Rush. Naida West and Alton Pryor wanted to celebrate the anniversary of the Gold Rush with a booth at the Fair, but the cost for a booth was prohibitive for a single author. They made a special agreement with the Fair, which has lasted for the last 24 years. In all that time, there has been only one significant change: book genres are not limited to California history.

In 2018, I took over the management of the booth and during the two Covid years, we did not have a Fair, but last year, we were invited back. For the authors that participated, it was a good year. We had record sales, even with a reduced author presence. Fairgoers were excited to return to the Fair and buy books from their favorite writers.

The primary mission of the Booth is for authors to visit with fairgoers about writing and publishing. For that reason, our location has always been in the A/B building, which features educational matters of public interest. All book genres are accepted for display and sale, with the exception of those that are political, religious, or sexual. We believe a book should be judged by its quality.

That being said, the Fair does have some requirements. Authors must provide copies of the books to be vetted by the booth manager. Since the Fair is a family friendly event, covers cannot be explicitly sexual, promote any religion, or espouse any singular political beliefs.

Unlike other venues that authors participate in, the Fair is unique. Seven authors are in the booth at the same time. Authors are not allowed to go out and engage with the fairgoers beyond the booth, and they are not allowed to carnival bark at visitors if they are just passing through. Sometimes this makes it difficult for authors who are aggressive in their sales, because they feel there is nothing wrong with going and getting sales, but it is one of the surest ways we can lose the booth in the future.

The Fair provides tables, folding chairs, display cases, and storage. We work eight-hour shifts because the booth has to be manned from start to finish of the Fair each day. Authors handle all their own sales and self-report out to the Fair; however, we do have a voluntary option to sell your books outside of your appointed days. Beyond a small payment for liability insurance and postage, the only cost is 15% of the author's after-tax sales payable to the Fair at the end of the author's assigned dates – this is far less than the \$4,000 to \$5,000 other vendors must pay upfront to be part of the Fair.

What many authors don't understand is that the Fair is not associated with any writing group. You do not have an automatic acceptance because you belong to a local writing organization.

As manager, I have signed a contract with the Fair already. My job is to staff it with seven authors each day, maintain authors in the booth from start to finish of the Fair, act as liaison between Fair personnel and the authors, troubleshoot for the authors, and help authors sell books when they are not in the booth. The more we all sell, the more likely we will be asked back to the Fair.

Why am I writing about this for my president's message? Due to Covid, the number of authors willing to work the Fair diminished, and I'd like to add a few new voices to the booth. If you have a book that you think would be a fit for the Fair, and you're able to work a few eight-hour days, please contact me.

Note, you need to be willing to check your email regularly. If you only check your email once a month or even once a week, this won't work. Many times, I have contacted authors only to not hear from them for weeks. Decisions often have to be made within a day, so if you know you are difficult to get a hold of, please realize this won't work.

What do you gain by participating the Fair? A chance to sell your books for a minimum expense to you. A chance to network with fellow authors. A chance to get exposure for your work. A chance to build your mailing list with avid readers. A chance to experience the fun of the Fair. There's really nothing like it.

Editor's Note: Author's Booth (AB) @ St Fair: It's a privilege to be chosen to participate in selling ones' books in the AB, something I've been honored to do since 2015, and I'm always excited at the anticipation of being back each year, for the camaraderie between all, to meet new authors, and how we have each other's' backs. Michelle only touched on how fortunate we are, in the rare deal that was made with the Fair in 1999. * I want to stress how important it is that we all graciously follow the guidelines and rules given by the Fair in order to continue being allowed that special agreement. We can be dropped for just one minor complaint to the Fair, or by encroaching upon another author's sales discussions in an attempt to sell your own books, rudely eating something messy while working a sale, or constantly leaving early and not committing to your hours, which is a Fair requirement, and leaves Michelle in a bind with an empty table scheduled to be manned from open to close. NONE of us would make enough in sales even if we were there every hour of the 17 days, to come close to pay one booth fee on our own. * Sales vary from day to day, but worthwhile for the exposure you get, if nothing else, plus NCPA has gained new members: Sharon and I recruited our President, Michelle, to NCPA from the Fair in 2015, a bonus for NCPA, but that doesn't mean NCPA members are automatically invited – there are no special perks for NCPA, we're just in a position to know about the Fair when Michelle does, but we still have to go through the same process as everyone else!

What Do "e.g." and "i.e." Really Mean — And When Should We Use Them? | Word Genius **From Merriam Webster Dictionary:**

Obviously, Sandra used i.e., correctly, but someone once used it incorrectly in an anthology story, and when I received an unsolicited email on it from Word Genius last week, I thought it would be the time to address both i.e., and e.g., in a newsletter. It's ironic Sandra should use it in the email (below) at the exact same time. So, what better place than right here on the same page to add the info? BTW, a quick and easy way how I've always easily remembered is "i.e., means 'that is;", and "e.g., means 'such as", and repeat it to myself prior to using, so I've never had a problem with either, but here are the long versions for both!

What to Know: I.e., means "that is," as in "She's a Hoosier, i.e., she's from Indiana." E.g., means "for example," as in "She roots for the local teams, e.g., the Pacers and the Colts."

How to Use 'i.e.,' *l.e.*, stands for the Latin *id est*, or 'that is,' and is used to introduce a word or phrase that restates what has been said previously. What follows the i.e., is meant to clarify the earlier statement: It's similarly useful for defining or explaining a term or concept whose meaning readers might not know: While i.e., is often set off by brackets or parentheses, it can also sometimes follow a comma or em dash. It is usually followed by a comma.

How to Use 'e.g.,': E.g., means "for example." (It stands for exempli gratia in Latin.) Used in much the same ways as 'for example,' coming before an item or list of items. E.g., is similar to i.e., in the way it is punctuated: it is often placed inside brackets or parentheses, and can sometimes follow a comma or em dash. It is also usually followed by a comma.

I Just Published My First Novel! How'd That Happen?

I've loved to read since I was a young child growing up on my family's ranch in Southwest Colorado. My mother, an avid reader and writer herself, encouraged my exploration of the world of imagination found between the pages of a book. I had my first library card at age 8 and checked out *Alice in Wonderland* as my first book, though I could only comprehend about every other word. Reading was my main form of entertainment along with enjoying the original *Star Trek, Lost in Space*, and *The Twilight Zone* television shows. As I grew older, I read Nancy Drew books and gothic novels.

My family made a life-changing move to Los Angeles, California just before I entered high school. It was a difficult transition but my love of reading followed me. I had a wonderful English teacher in high school who encouraged an interest in the classics and praised my book reports. As a youth, books like 1984 and Brave New World captured my interest. The movie Soylent Green was released the year I graduated high school. During college I focused on my life science and business courses but continued to read a variety of authors' works. The movie Star Wars was released during that time and I enjoyed its imaginary world and unique characters.

Fast forward to the 1980s. My two babies and a full-time career in nonprofit program management took most of my time. Reading became a luxury but my husband and I enjoyed science fiction movies. The *Terminator* films dominated the decade. New adventures of the *Star Trek* realm filled television screens. My children watched the reruns as they grew older. My son and I enjoyed the *X-Files* series. He enjoyed exploring the world of science fiction literature while my daughter became a fan of Harry Potter. We had some interesting discussions about these other-world adventures. I can thank them both for believing in me and for encouraging me to pursue my interest in writing when I retired. My daughter gives detailed, thoughtful, critique of my writing. My son listens to my plot lines, asks questions, and offers suggestions from the perspective of a fellow science-fiction buff. Their input has been very helpful and supportive.

I read a lot of popular literature once my children left home but I never lost my interest in science fiction. When my health forced me into an early retirement, I moved to the San Francisco Bay Area to be near my family. To meet new people and explore my latent interest in writing, I joined a member-run group in 2017 called "Finding Your Voice". We met two Saturdays a month at the Pinole Library to write to a prompt and share our work. Positive feedback from the group, which included former teachers, kept me writing.

Sharon Darrow attended an Indie Author Day event at the Pinole Library in October 2019. She gave a Self-Publishing 101 speech and talked about the Northern California Publishers and Authors (NCPA) group. That was my lucky day! I discovered all the benefits of joining NCPA. Sharon encouraged me to join and to submit a story for the next anthology. My upsetting move as a teenager became the subject of my first published short story. *The Road Ahead* in the NCPA anthology, Destination the World Vol. I. I have a story or memoir published in every subsequent NCPA anthology.

Then the COVID pandemic hit in 2020.


I had also joined a memoir writing group at the local senior center. Both the "<u>Memoiristas</u>" and the Pinole Library Writers Group had to suspend meetings. To keep our creative spirits alive, we continued to meet through Zoom and by e-mail. Submitting weekly writing samples and sharing feedback helped me to further build my skills. I won first place for my memoir *Turning Ten* and a third-place ribbon for my short story *Nightmare*, at the 2021 San Mateo County Fair writing competition.

When it was suggested by my Pinole friend group that I turn my short story *The Pod* into a novel, I was taken aback. I didn't think I had the ability to write an entire science fiction book but the idea was intriguing. I felt that I needed more formal training. It had been a long time since my high school literature class.

I was fortunate to find Gabriela Pereira's comprehensive and well organized *Do It Yourself Master's in Fine Arts (DIYMFA)* on-line Writing 101 course. I completed it over the summer of 2020 during the height of the pandemic. I gained helpful, detailed tools and guidelines for writing a book. The course information gave me the confidence I needed to start writing my novel.

About 10 chapters and ten months into my book my confidence again slipped. I wasn't sure where I wanted to go with the plot and I was insecure about my level of writing. Fortunately, I learned about NCPA President, and author Michelle Hamilton's, in-depth *Plot to Print* class and signed up to take her 10-week course over the summer of 2021. Writing, submitting chapters to classmates, and reviewing others work during class provided the impetus to finish my novel. Thank you, Michelle, Penny, June, and Denise for reading my chapters and providing valuable critiques. Thank you, Michelle, for guiding me through the final steps to publication.

I self-published The Reclamation: Earth Under Siege on Amazon on January 8, 2023.


